

Course Syllabus

Welcome to **The Japanese Writing System: An Introduction to Hiragana and Katakana** by Japan Fuji Online. This course is designed to provide beginners in Japanese with a solid foundation for the Japanese writing system.

Lessons

Learning the Japanese writing system is your first step to being able to communicate in Japanese. It is often taught at the beginning of most long term Japanese language courses at both the high school and college levels.

The course is divided into:

- An introduction
- A chapter on hiragana
- A chapter on katakana
- Final exam

The Introduction contains two videos, followed by a short quiz to test your understanding. Each chapter contains nine video lessons, each followed by a short quiz. These quizzes are not graded, but if you are not able to answer all the questions correctly, you can rewatch the video and practice so you can successfully answer all the questions. The videos range from 3 to 8 minutes in length.

Videos include audio recordings of Japanese pronunciations by native Japanese teachers, hiragana and katakana animations to show stroke orders of each character, and come with downloadable kana practice sheets.

What You'll Need

It is recommended that you have access to a high speed internet connection, access to a printer in order to print out the practice sheets, and a pen or pencil. That's it!

Final Exam

At the end of the course is a final exam with 30 questions. It is comprehensive and evaluates your overall understanding of the learning material. The passing grade is at least 70 percent. If you are unable to pass on your first time, you can retake it as often as you need in order to pass.

Students who participate in this online course are on the honor system. Please give it your best effort. You can complete this course in less than 2 hours, and have a very good understanding of the hiragana and katakana. But remember, as you advance in your Japanese language studies, not only will you have to recognize these characters, but also pronounce, write, and read them naturally. It will only enhance your retention by revisiting the videos and practice sheets as often as you can.

After successful completion, students will be able to download a Certificate of Completion.

At the end of this course, you should be able to recognize, write, and pronounce all 46 basic hiragana characters, 46 katakana characters, 25 modified hiragana, and 25 modified katakana characters.
